REMEMBERING SEPTEMBER 11TH WITH MUSIC

Today at 6 p.m., St. John's Cathedral will host a free Peace Concert to commemorate this historic date and to reaffirm the hope for world peace. A reception will follow in Taliaferro Hall. This event is co-sponsored by the Jacksonville Sister Cities Association and the University of North Florida. The Jacksonville Sister Cities Association is a nonprofit organization staffed entirely by volunteers. The mission of the Association is to foster and encourage mutual understanding, friendship and peace through cultural, economic, educational and professional exchanges.



Please make plans to attend as we come together with cities around the world to celebrate life and universal humanity. Performing ensembles will include choirs from the University of North Florida, the Douglas Anderson School of the Arts, and the Jacksonville Children's Chorus. Also featured will be the world premier of "On Peace" for soprano, trumpet and organ, by local composer Tony Steve. The piece will feature Paula Merritt, soprano, and Cliff Newton, trumpet. This composition, commissioned especially for this concert, draws on text from the twelfth-century abbess and mystic Hildegard von Bingen.

MEET OUR NEW SENIOR CHORISTER DIRECTOR



Paula Merritt, soprano, is a Voice Instructor at Edward Waters College in Jacksonville, Florida. She teaches applied voice and Diction for Singers, Class Voice and an Opera Workshop. Ms. Merritt began her undergraduate studies at the University of North Florida. She earned her Bachelor of Music in Voice Performance from UNF, where she studied with Dr. William Brown. She went on to earn a Master of Music in Vocal Performance from Oklahoma City University, under the tutelage of Vicki Kelly. As a student of the University of Miami she trained with Dr. Esther Jane Hardenbergh and toured Austria with the U.M. Frost School of Music at Salzburg program. Ms. Merritt has done additional vocal study with the Palm Beach Opera Resident Artist Program under Kamal Khan and conductors Julius Rudel and Bruno Aprea.

As a singer, Ms. Merritt has performed in many operas including: *Les contes d'Hoffman*, *Dialogues des Carmélites*, *Madame Butterfly*, *Tosca*, *Le nozze di Figaro*, *Carmen*, *Manon Lescaut*, *Faust*, *Aida*, *Lucia di Lammermoor*, *La traviata*, *Naughty Marietta*, and *Don Giovanni*. In addition, she has performed at Claflin University and presented at the MTNA conference at Oberlin Conservatory. She performed as a soloist at First Church of Christ Scientists in Coral Gables for three years. Ms. Merritt taught elementary school music in Miami, Florida and is the new Director of the Senior Choristers at St. John's Cathedral, Jacksonville. She also has performed major choral works with the Jacksonville Symphony Chorus. There will be a voice recital featuring Ms. Merritt at the cathedral next Sunday, September 18, at 3 p.m. in Taliaferro Hall.

Now it is I who speak in judgment against them. "For my people are foolish, they do not know me; they are stupid children, they have no understanding.
