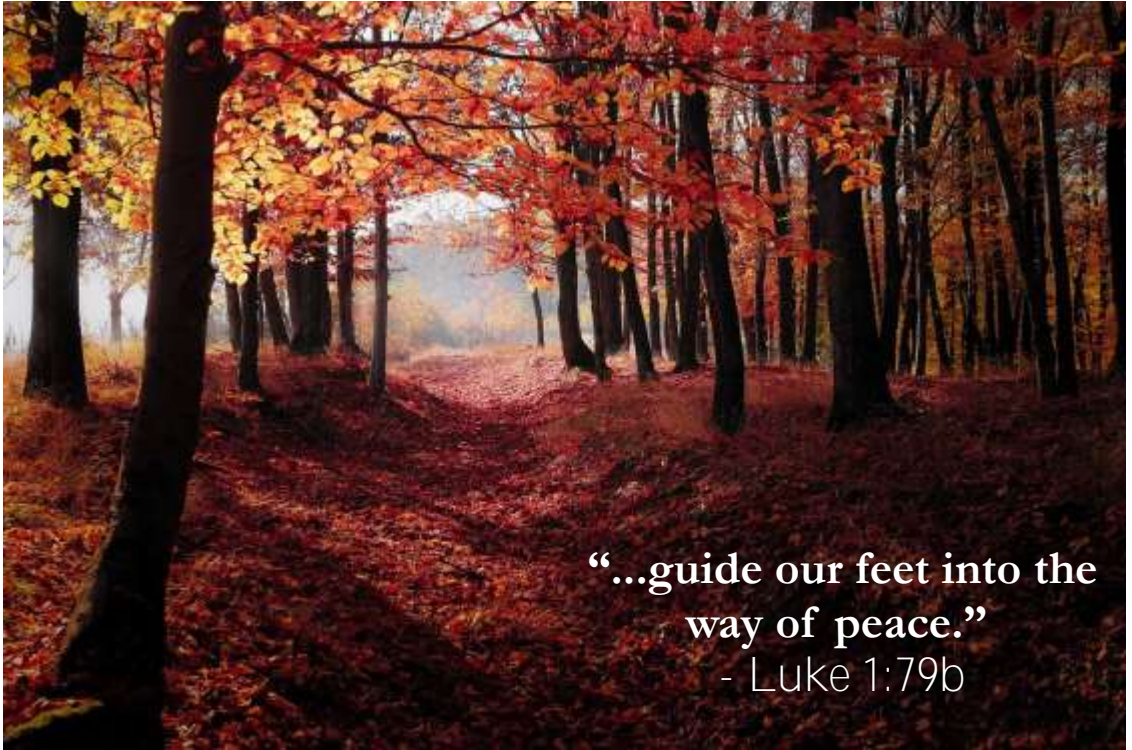

THE BEAUTY OF CHORAL EVENSONG

The service of Choral Evensong, which originated during the Reformation in the Church England, is one of our denomination's great liturgical and musical gifts to Christendom. Evolving out of the pre-Reformation services of Vespers and Compline, which themselves trace roots back to the earliest centuries of the Christian church (and in some respects back further still to the ancient Judaic tradition), Evensong is widely loved for being a peace-inducing service in which the 'song' of voices blending together in harmony allows listeners time for restful contemplation and spiritual reflection at the close of day.



One of the driving forces behind the musical development of this service as we know it now has been the centuries-old practice in many Cathedrals and large parish churches of supporting professional choirs, often in conjunction with choir schools. This practice has continued to provide an environment of highly skilled choirs, which, combined with the many inspirational texts and prayers found in the liturgy, has provided highly fertile ground for the talents of some of the greatest composers throughout the centuries. Such luminaries as William Byrd, Henry Purcell, G. F. Handel, C. V. Stanford, Herbert Howells, and countless others have contributed to the rich and diverse canon of sacred music we hear at Evensong services today.

It is interesting to note that the development of our common understanding of the term “Anthem” is to be found in the development of the Evensong liturgy as well. A choral anthem, as understood in the context of sacred liturgies to refer to a freely composed piece of choral music intended to be sung by a trained choir, makes its first appearance in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, where a rubric states, “In Quires and Places where they sing, here followeth the Anthem.” It was also at this point in history when the Anthem found its familiar place immediately following the third Collect in the Evensong liturgy, where it remains to this day.



Please mark your calendars to join us this Sunday, November 20 at 5 p.m. for one of our most beloved annual Evensong services: our service in honor of St. Andrew, patron saint of Scotland. Featured will be the Cathedral Choir, the Cathedral Brass, and the Jacksonville Pipes & Drums. The following Sunday, November 27 at 5 p.m., will feature an evening musical service of a quite different variety: our candle-lit service of Advent Procession with Carols. This service, my personal favorite of the liturgical year, features hymns and carols sung by the Cathedral Choir in various locations and formations throughout the church. During the course of the

service the lights gradually come up, symbolizing the movement from darkness to light in celebration of the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

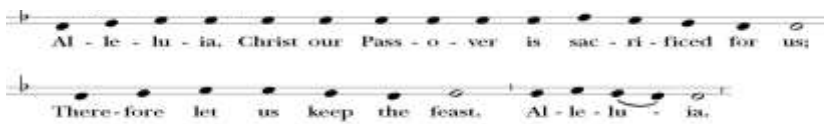

► **New Art Exhibit in Taliaferro Hall: "Imagination Cannot be Caged"**

A new exhibition by Nadine Terk, entitled "Imagination Cannot Be Caged," is in Taliaferro Hall until Sunday, January 15. Terk is the president of and a performer in the Civic Orchestra of Jacksonville, and is a marvelous visual artist as well as a gifted musician. The works in this exhibition are the result of her internship at the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival where she was the first Visual Artist in Residence.

The paintings in the exhibition are an exploration of movement and sound. Working in abstraction and thinking about mood and tempo, the paintings represent a bow moving through space as music is created. Terk, as you might suspect, plays the violin. The abstract images move in and out of space in patterns that suggest the musical compositions that are their inspiration. In one painting, Terk turns to nature, and the rays of the sun which appear from the clouds suggest images not unlike those in her other paintings. This magnificent world of nature and imagination that Terk evokes bursts forth and cannot be caged. A reception and gallery talk by the artist is being planned and will be announced at a later date.

CALL FOR VESTRY NOMINATIONS AND CONVENTION DELEGATES

The Vestry bylaws provide for a nominating committee to nominate candidates for vacancies on the vestry as well as candidates for the offices of Delegate to the Diocesan Convention.

Qualifications for Vestry members (4 to be elected): A Vestry nominee must be a **communicant of St. John's Cathedral in good standing for a period of at least 12 months prior to election**; if a nominee has served two full terms (for a total of six years), there must be a two-year break before he or she may be nominated again; must be actively involved in the ministry of the Parish; must be willing to accept active leadership, including responsibility for decision making that represents the entire Parish; must, if called upon, serve on the boards of affiliated corporations of the Cathedral; must be willing to invest the time necessary in the ministry of leadership, including attendance at worship, Vestry meetings and other scheduled Vestry activities, special events, and satellite activities; and must be otherwise eligible. In addition to the above qualifications contained in the bylaws, the Vestry believes that nominees for service for the next three-year term should possess special skills, gifts and talents in visionary and strategic thinking, be courageous, and have skills in fiscal planning and policy.

Diocesan Convention Delegates (2 to be elected): **Per the St. John's Parish by-laws**, the Sr. Warden fills one of the 5 delegate positions. The remaining four convention delegates serve a two year term, with one or two rotating off each year. At the 2017 Annual Parish Meeting, we will elect two delegates and two alternates for the 2018 diocesan convention. It is critically important that you obtain the permission of your nominee before submitting his or her name to a Nominating Committee member. (Please note: the By-Laws have been amended so that parishioners choose Vestry members by election at the annual meeting rather than through a selection (lottery) process.)
